The 2009 Mississippi Council for the Social Studies Fall Conference was held at Pearl River Resort on October 19-20. The theme of the conference was *Embrace the Future*. The two-day event began on Monday morning with an optional pre-conference clinic entitled *Mississippi Teachers On the Road Again - True Experiential Learning*. The workshop featured thirteen past participants of the Mississippi Studies Summer Institute, who shared lesson plans, resources, and their experiences at the institute. Other MCSS members enjoyed an optional pre-conference Civil Rights Driving Tour to notable locations in Neshoba County, in tribute to the local heroes of the Civil Rights movement.

The conference proper kicked off Monday afternoon with the General Opening Session. President Kim Este welcomed the group and provided an overview of the program. A number of conference sessions provided information about social studies programs, including: Representative Democracy in America, We the People, Project Citizen, Virtual Economics, and Strange Things in Geography. Other sessions offered tips on teaching geography creatively, teaching U.S. history through the Presidents, and using tech-

nology in social studies classrooms.

On Monday evening, MCSS members were treated to a welcome reception sponsored by the Mississippi Geographic Alliance, with Mississippi author Neil White attending as a special guest. On Tuesday, plenary session keynote speaker Melanie Auth of the Close Up Foundation provided MCSS members with a thought provoking presentation on *The Close Up Experience - Democracy in Action*. During the Business Luncheon, members enjoyed an abundant spread of Southern favorites. MCSS was honored to have Phil Hardwick, the Coordinator of Capacity Development at the John C. Stennis Institute of Government at Mississippi State University as the keynote speaker. Other highlights of the conference included Vendor Alley, Coffee with Your District Coordinator and the announcement of the 2009 Jesse Palmer Social Studies Educator of the year Christy Walker.

The Mississippi Council for the Social Studies invites nominations of educators to be considered for the 2010 Jesse Palmer Social Studies Educator of the Year Award. Established in memory of Dr. Jesse Palmer, this award is given each year to an educator who demonstrates exemplary knowledge, skills, and dispositions in promoting quality social studies education in Mississippi schools.

To be considered for this award, an educator must have at least three years of teaching experience, be currently involved in a social studies-related profession, and submit an application packet that includes the following:

I. Vitae

- A. Name and contact information (address, phone number, e-mail)
- B. Current and past education-related employment
- C. Educational background (degrees held, specialized training, other)
- D. Positions of leadership held (professional, civic, other)
- E. Honors and awards received
- F. Participation in professional organizations (memberships, service, other)
- G. Workshops, seminars, professional development of note (organized, presented, attended)
- H. Other relevant information as deemed appropriate

II. Questionnaire (Answer each of the following in a paragraph or more.)

- A. Why did you choose to become a professional educator?
- B. What is your philosophy of teaching?
- C. What is your approach to social studies education?
- D. In what ways do you “go above and beyond” to be the best professional you can be?

III. Supporting Documentation

- A. Letter of recommendation from a current supervisor
- B. Letter of recommendation from a current colleague
- C. Letter of recommendation from a current or former student

and will become Principal beginning in the 2010-2011 school year. The married father of 3 has been at Morton High for 9 years, teaching social studies for 8 of those years.

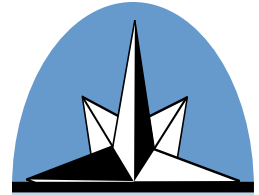
