Dr. Dennis Mitchell to Highlight MCSS Conference Reception at Pearl River Resort October 16-17

Dr. Dennis Mitchell, Professor of History at Mississippi State University at Meridian and author of *A New History of Mississippi*, will be the guest author during the 2014 MCSS Conference.

“Creating the first comprehensive narrative of Mississippi since the bicentennial history was published in 1976, Dennis J. Mitchell recounts the vibrant and turbulent history of a Deep South state,” according to the University Press of Mississippi. “The author has condensed the massive scholarship produced since that time into an appealing narrative, which incorporates people missing from many previous histories including American Indians, women, African Americans, and a diversity of other minority groups. This is the story of a place and its people, history makers and ordinary citizens alike. Mississippi’s rich flora and fauna are also central to the story, which follows both natural and man-made destruction and the major efforts to restore and defend rare untouched areas.”

Dr. Mitchell will speak at the opening reception of the MCSS annual conference Thursday, Oct. 16 at 6:30. He also will be available to sign copies of his new book and copies of the book will be available for purchase.



“We are pleased to have such an accomplished Mississippi scholar joining us for the conference this year,” said MCSS President Chuck Yarborough. “Dr. Mitchell’s work offers Social Studies teachers across our state and region valuable resources for classroom use. To have him interact directly with our conference attendees is absolutely fantastic.”

In addition to his most recent book, Dr. Mitchell is also the author of *A Rich Past A Vibrant Future: The History & Renovation of the Marks Rothenberg and Grand Opera House Buildings*; *Mississippi Liberal: A Biography of Frank E. Smith* and *Mississippi: Portrait of an American State*, among others.

30th ANNUAL MDAH SOCIAL STUDIES TEACHER’S WORKSHOP

The Annual Social Studies Teachers Workshop will be held at the Old Capitol Museum on Friday, November 7. This year’s subject is *Turn-of-the-Century Mississippi*. The coming of the twentieth century saw great changes throughout Mississippi—social, economic, and industrial.

The state’s constitution was rewritten and adopted in 1890 to codify the privileges of white men and institutionalize the impediments to women and African American citizens. The United States and Mississippi were drawn into a world war. Natural disaster ravaged the fertile Delta

counties. And a new, native art form was born in the blues.

Come to the Old Capitol Museum and learn more about this time in Mississippi’s history and how to use the information in your classrooms. Political analyst Jere Nash will speak about the rise of Jim Crow in Mississippi and Dr. Pamela Tyler from the University of Southern Mississippi will discuss woman suffrage in Mississippi. Additional presentations will cover the Mississippi State Capitol and teaching genealogical research, the blues, the 1927 flood, and prohibition in Mississippi.

A .5 CEU credit will be issued through Mississippi College to those attending all workshop programs. Cost is \$40.00. Mississippi Department of Archives and History Resource on the Twentieth Century

Regular readers of the MDAH Educator E-News and the Mississippi History for Teachers Facebook page may recall the education staff's foray into gardening last summer. We were working on a teaching unit about the *World War II Home Front in Mississippi* which meant that we naturally had to test out a science-based activity about how to grow Victory Gardens in terrariums. Happily, not only the garden but the six-day unit was a huge success, and the latter is now available for free on the MDAH website.

The teaching unit uses a combination of social studies, language arts, math, and science activities to look at topics such as prop-

The unit is also filled with a wide variety of primary source documents including letters from Mississippians serving overseas, newspaper clippings, cartoons, and Schools at War scrapbook photographs from across the state.

Because the World War II teaching unit ends with an activity titled "Civil Rights in a Post-War World," it is appropriate that the second teaching unit completed this year is titled *Civil Rights in Mississippi*. This six-day teaching unit provides an overview of the Mississippi Civil Rights Movement from the 1950s into the 1970s. Key people and events, such as the murder of Emmett Till and Fannie Lou Hamer's speech at the National Democratic Convention are analyzed along with the

lesser-known stories of Dr. Gilbert Mason's Biloxi wade-ins and the work of postman-turned-lawyer Jack Young and his wife Aurelia.

These teaching units join two previously completed teaching units titled *Slavery in Mississippi* and *Freedom Riders: Journey for Change*. All are in alignment with Mississippi Department of Education frameworks and Common Core Curriculum.
